ePortfolios: Personal and Social Identity Theories

- Hall (2011) suggests
- 1. A major driver of ePortfolios in education is assessment
- 2. Students and academics often see little value beyond assessing and recording achievement
- Zubizaretta also sums it up quite nicely when academics see "e" as one more damn thing (Hall, 2011)
- However ePortfolios can also be creative and often work along the FaceBook model where students document a life story – albeit a professional life story.
- So how can we move ePortfolios from some of these constraints to one where they can support students to capture work based learning and help with employability.

ePortfolios: Personal and Social Identity Theories

- One way we can do this has been suggested by Darren Cambridge (2010)
- In his work he suggests that personal and social identity theories can be used to underpin a "personalised portfolio"
- By completing a personalised ePortfolio the individual clearly has in mind the audience: hence the use of personal and social theories
- This then underpins the persons learning and guides their choices

ePortfolios: Personal and Social Identity Theories

- The challenge of course is how we can embed these ideas for our learners and staff – and this will be the aim of the group work to follow.
- Darren Cambridge talks about the convergence of the technology, blogs and social networks.
- But Cambridge states that blogs and social networks are often written to keep family and friends up-to-date with what's going on, or as a general cathartic exercise
- Again I suggest that moving these general ideas to a point where it can help employability and workbased learning is key
